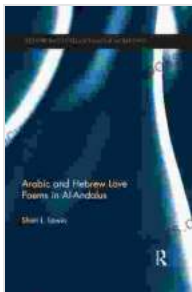

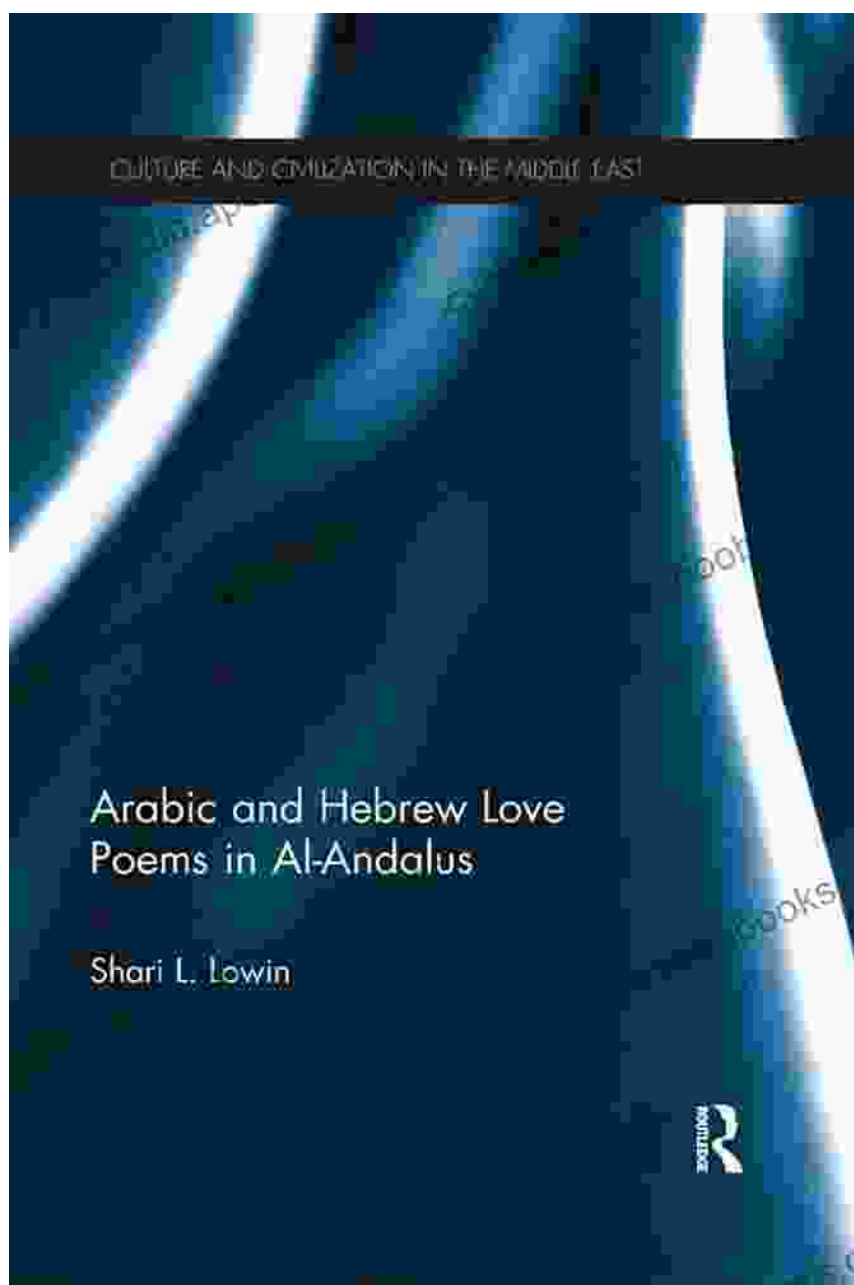

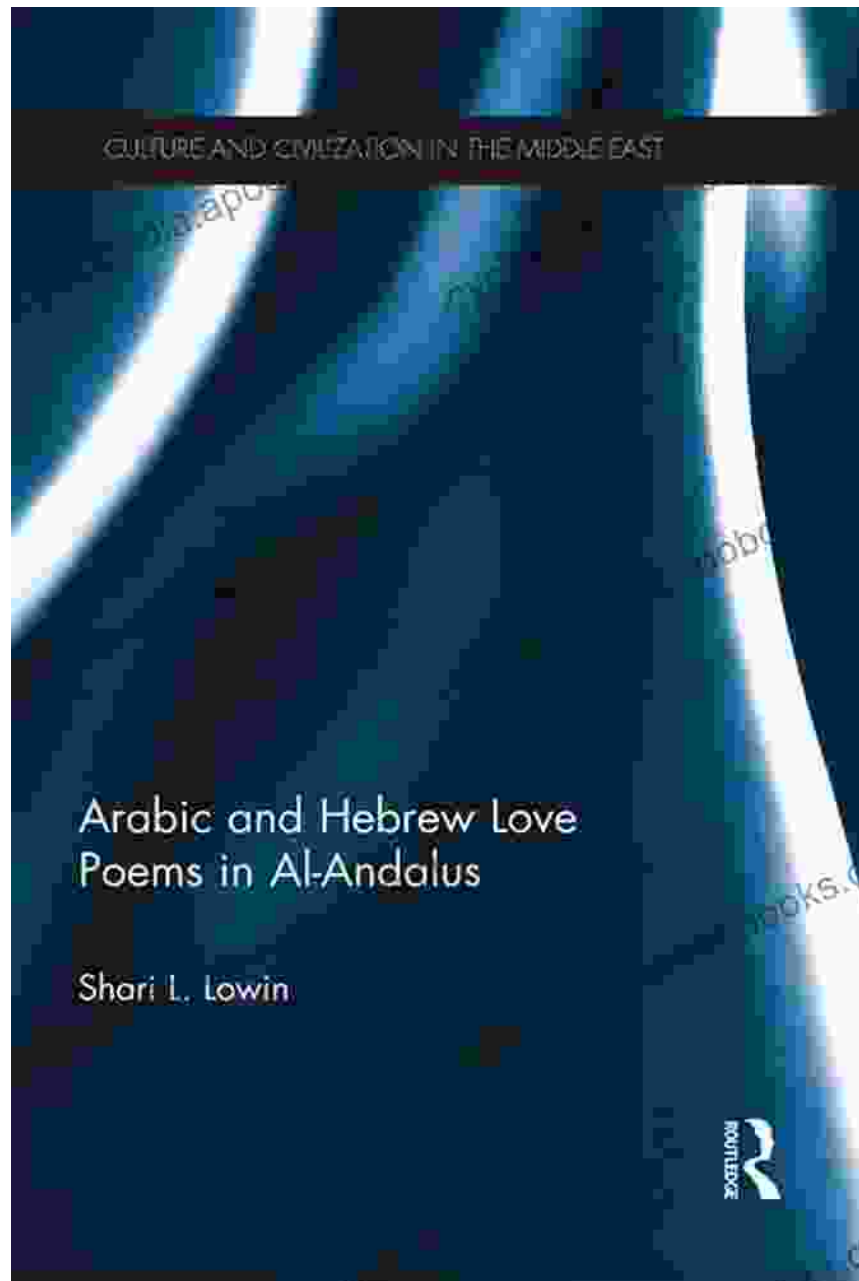
***“My heart is on fire with love for you,

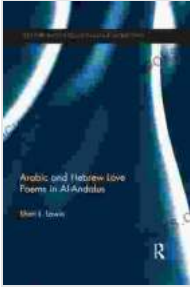

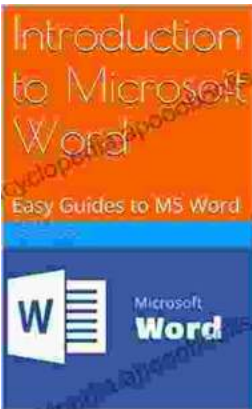
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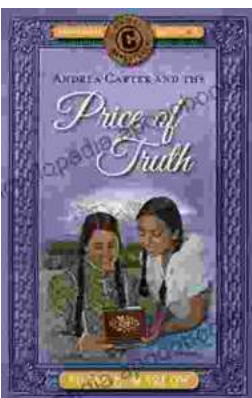


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
