

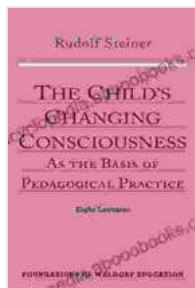

- **Middle childhood** (ages 8-14): of formal academic subjects, with a focus on developing critical thinking and problem-solving skills.
- **Adolescence** (ages 15-18): A more specialized curriculum that supports students in finding their unique path and preparing for higher education or vocational training.

The Role of the Teacher

In Steiner's pedagogy, the teacher plays a crucial role as a guide and facilitator of learning. The teacher's task is not to impart knowledge but to create an environment in which students can discover their own potential:

- Teachers should be well-rounded individuals who embody the principles of the threefold nature.
- They should have a deep understanding of child development and be able to adapt their teaching to the needs of each student.
- They should foster a respectful and collaborative classroom environment that encourages curiosity, creativity, and self-expression.

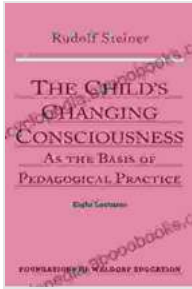
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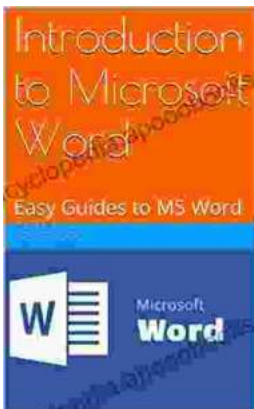
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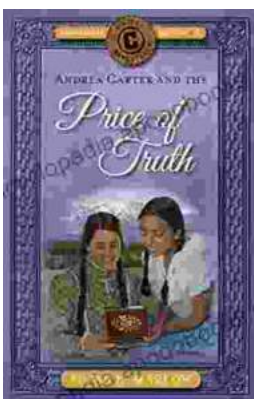


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
