



Stages of Periodontal Disease



Gingivitis

The most common and earliest form of periodontal disease is gingivitis. The gingiva is the pink tissue that surrounds the teeth and is commonly referred to as "gum tissue". Hence, if the gingiva is inflamed, the term gingivitis is used. Inflammation is caused by bacterial plaque (biofilm) accumulation. In the absence of effective daily oral hygiene, this results in a change of color from the tissue's normal pink to various shades of red. The affected area will usually become swollen and bleed when touched or probed. Pockets in excess of 2-4 millimeters may form.

Early or Mild Periodontitis

This stage clinically appears as painless gingivitis with redness, bleeding on probing, and gum swelling. What distinguishes periodontitis ("pocket" = around; "disease") - from gingivitis is bone loss. Once oral inflammation extends from the gingiva to the bone tissue and begins causing bone loss, this condition is referred to as periodontitis. Here the pocket depth is usually less than approximately 4-6 millimeters.

Moderate Periodontitis

As the disease progresses from mild to moderate inflammation and infection extend deeper into the tissues — resulting in 20-50% bone loss from around the tooth roots. Pocket depths may measure 6-8 millimeters, or more, such as bleeding, swelling and redness will remain and may be visible. Smoking cigarettes* will mask some of these signs and prevent the condition.

Advanced Periodontitis

When bone loss is severe, representing 50-80% of bone support from the tooth root, teeth become very loose and uncomfortable during functional movements (chewing). Pocket depths may range from 7-12 millimeters. Signs and symptoms will remain, such as bleeding, swelling, redness, and probably dark stains marked by the smoking of cigarettes* which will worsen the condition.

* Cigarettes reduce blood flow and often hide the signs of periodontal disease.






