

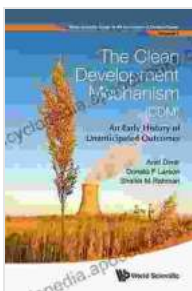

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Female and male antisocial trajectories: From childhood origins to adult outcomes

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Abstract

This article reports on the childhood origins and adult outcomes of female versus male antisocial behavior trajectories in the Dunedin Longitudinal Study. Four antisocial behavior trajectory groups were identified: nonconduct disorder and male, using general growth mixture modeling and included life-course persistent (LCP), adolescence-limited (AL), childhood-limited and nonconduct disorder groups. During childhood, both LCP females and males were characterized by social, familial and individual psychological risk factors, whereas those on the adolescence-limited pathway were characterized by 25,000 and 100,000 LCP pathways, were engaging in antisocial behavior and experiencing low life-course mental health, physical health, and economic problems. Finally, both males and the adolescence-limited pathway of the LCP trajectory, findings support similarities across gender with respect to developmental trajectories of antisocial behavior and their associated childhood origins and adult consequences. Implications for theory, research, and practice are discussed.

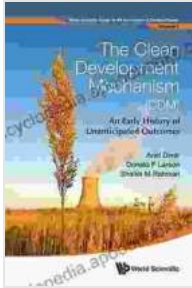
This article tests whether the two prototypes specified by a developmental taxonomy of antisocial behavior, life-course persistent (LCP)

and adolescence-limited (AL), can be identified within a prospective birth cohort of females and males via general growth mixture modeling (GGMM). Advanced longitudinal methods are applied to test taxonomic predictions regarding developmental course, childhood origins, and adult consequences, with particular attention to the study of gender differences in antisocial behavior.

Until recently, interested research directed at understanding trajectories of antisocial behavior has focused primarily on males (Lacourse, Nagin, Tremblay, Vitaro, & Chies, 2003; Schaffer, Peano, Lalongo, Posheska, & Kellman, 2003; Shaw, Loeber, & Nagin, 2003; Tremblay et al., 2004; Widom & Caspi, 2003). Classic longitudinal studies in life-course criminology and developmental psychology have established the importance of childhood-onset conduct problems and early involvement in antisocial behavior

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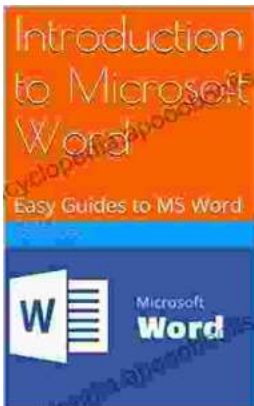


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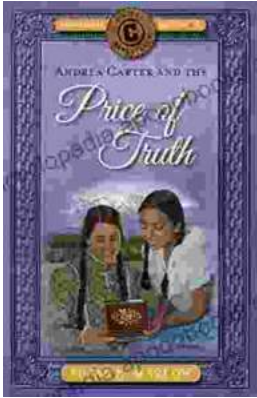
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
