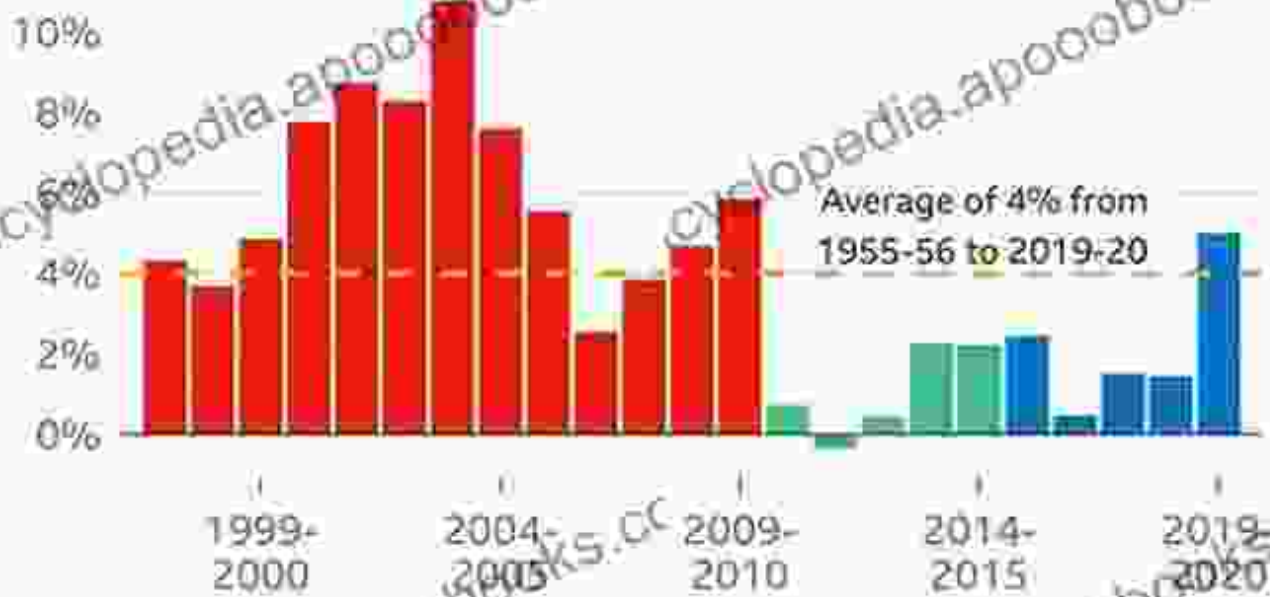


Financial Pressures
